Background info:



- Dr. Peter Marshall was born in May, 1902 in Scotland. He was strongly influenced in his impressionable years by Eric Liddell, not only for his great athletic ability, but also because of his modesty, his charm, and the great strength of his Christian witness (see movie guide for "*Chariots of Fire*"). When he moved to the U.S., he lived initially in the Atlanta area – he attended Columbia Theological Seminary, and then pastored First Presbyterian Church in Covington and Westminster Presbyterian Church in Atlanta. He later became pastor of the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington D.C. (known as the "*Church of the Presidents*").
- Peter Marshall served as the 57th Chaplain of the United States Senate, appointed by the members of the Senate to perform ceremonial, symbolic, and pastoral duties. One of the responsibilities this position entails is opening Senate sessions with prayer, which is one of the Senate's most enduring traditions. The Chaplain visits senators when they go to the hospital, represents the Senate in appearances before church groups across the nation, and hosts visiting religious figures at the Capitol. The Chaplain also provides pastoral care for the Senators, their staffs, and their families, and provides or oversees religious programs such as Bible study, reflection groups, and the weekly Senate Prayer Breakfast. The Chaplain also often presides over religious ceremonies such as funerals and memorial services for current or past members and delivers the invocation or benediction at many official U.S. ceremonies, including White House events. Along with the House Chaplain, the Senate Chaplain is responsible for overseeing the Capitol Prayer Room, located near the Capitol Rotunda. Dedicated in 1955,

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it is a place for members "who want to be alone with their God." The current (62nd) U.S. Senate Chaplain is Barry C. Black.

- Catherine attended Agnes Scott College here in Decatur, GA. Her book, "*A Man Called Peter*," stayed on the *New York Times* bestseller list for fifty consecutive weeks. This movie became 20th Century Fox's biggest box-office hit of 1955. Men entered the ministry because of the film that changed the lives of a generation of teenagers drawn to Peter Marshall's charismatic preaching. Catherine eventually wrote over 20 books, including many editions of Peter Marshall's sermons, several inspirational books, and the best-selling novel *Christy*. Books written or edited by her have sold over eighteen million copies in thirty-five languages.
- I wanted to share some of Peter Marshall's legacy with you before watching this movie. Peter's son, Peter John Marshall (1940 – 2010), who also became a Presbyterian minister, authored many books and founded "*Peter Marshall Ministries*." By tracing God's hand in American history, his vision was to educate Americans about God's role in the unfolding of our nation's destiny. He was concerned about the future of America and returning the nation to the original vision of the Founding Fathers. He also published his parents' works and developed many educational materials. This ministry has continued under the guidance of Peter John's daughter Mary, who has a passion for personal restoration and global revival. She believes that God longs for intimate relationship with His people and that the believer's greatest privilege is to represent the Kingdom of Heaven on earth. Her ministry focuses on meeting God both in our personal lives and in the world around us by gaining a Scriptural understanding of His character and our identities in relation to Him. It is her desire to empower both herself and others to appropriate and walk in the abundant life referenced in John 15.
- After Peter Marshall's death, Catherine had a dream that she was allowed to visit him briefly, to see him in his new setting. She found him working in a rose garden, surrounded by those perfect hybrid tea roses he always wanted to grow. After a while, he said playfully, "*I know perfectly well what you've been doing, Catherine. You're writing a book . . . It's all right, Kate. Go ahead and write it. Tell it all, if it will prove to people that a man can love the Lord and not be a sissy . . .*"

Scriptures:

Romans 12:1 – 2 (NLT) – “*And so, dear brothers and sisters, I plead with you to give your bodies to God because of all he has done for you. Let them be a living and holy sacrifice—the kind he will find acceptable. This is truly the way to worship him. Don’t copy the behavior and customs of this world, but let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think. Then you will learn to know God’s will for you, which is good and pleasing and perfect.*”

James 4:13 – 16 (NLT) – “*Look here, you who say, ‘Today or tomorrow we are going to a certain town and will stay there a year. We will do business there and make a profit.’ How do you know what your life will be like tomorrow? Your life is like the morning fog—it’s here a little while, then it’s gone. What you ought to say is, ‘If the Lord wants us to, we will live and do this or that.’ Otherwise you are boasting about your own plans, and all such boasting is evil.*”

John 3:16 (NLT) – “*For God loved the world so much that he gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life.*”

Revelation 21:1 – 7 (NLT) – “*Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the old heaven and the old earth had disappeared. And the sea was also gone. And I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven like a bride beautifully dressed for her husband. I heard a loud shout from the throne, saying, ‘Look, God’s home is now among his people! He will live with them, and they will be his people. God himself will be with them. He will wipe every tear from their eyes, and there will be no more death or sorrow or crying or pain. All these things are gone forever.’ And the one sitting on the throne said, ‘Look, I am making everything new!’ And then he said to me, ‘Write this down, for what I tell you is trustworthy and true.’ And he also said, ‘It is finished! I am the Alpha and the Omega—the Beginning and the End. To all who are thirsty I will give freely from the springs of the water of life. All who are victorious will inherit all these blessings, and I will be their God, and they will be my children.’*”

Romans 8:28 (NIV) – “*And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose.*”

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Discussion points:

1. It was said that this is the story of a man and his close friendship with God. In what ways can our lives reflect that kind of intimacy with God?

2. Peter said in one of his early sermons, "*The great things by which we really live are not proven by logic but by life . . . as that is true of love and beauty, so it is true of finding God and learning how close He stands to us.*" Discuss.

3. "*It isn't the church or religion that I'm trying to present, but Christ. Not the pale, anemic, namby-pamby, Jesus, the gentle Jesus meek and mild, but the Christ of the gospels.*" Compare and contrast who Jesus really is with how He is portrayed in the media, the Church, in popular culture.

4. Peter extended an open invitation to everyone to attend the church. In what ways can we as the Church become more welcoming and inviting (as Jesus was), and less like an exclusive club for a privileged few?

5. How does receiving the assurance that the Lord Jesus loves us dispel the fear of death? What has helped you face death with faith and trust?

6. What can we learn from the prayer lives of Peter and Catherine?

7. Peter Marshall's last prayer read in the Senate: "*Oh God, open our eyes and let us see how simple a man's life can be. Where we cannot convince, let us be willing to persuade. For small deeds done are better than great deeds planned. Amen.*" Discuss.

Cleanse Me, O God

Father, over and over again I have fallen into the same temptations. It does seem as if I am slow to learn Thy ways and Thy laws. I blush to recall my vows to Thee: never again to do what I have just come from doing, not again to stain myself in the same mudholes. Yet, O Lord, stained as I am, and conscious of my own weakness, I have no choice but to pick myself up again, to ask Thee to forgive me once more and make me clean again. I thank Thee, O Lord Jesus, for the glory of the Gospel of the Second Chance. I would claim from Thee that chance to begin all over again. Thou hast heard my prayer of confession. Now I claim Thy promise to forgive me and to cleanse me. From this moment I accept that forgiveness and that cleansing by faith, because I believe that Thy promise is the “word of a Gentleman of the most strict and sacred honor.” And now I ask for Thy spirit to come into me like cool fresh air to revitalize me, to shock me into a new discipleship, to invigorate me for a new life in Christ Jesus, my Lord. Amen.

For Humility on the Mountaintop of Life

Lord, forgive me that when life's circumstances lift me to the crest of the wave, I tend to forget Thee. Yet, like an errant child, I have blamed Thee with my every failure, even as I credit myself with every success. When my fears evaporate like the morning mist, then vainly I imagine that I am sufficient unto myself, that material resources and human resources are enough. I need Thee when the sun shines, lest I forget the storm and the dark. I need Thee when I am popular, when my friends and those who work beside me approve and compliment me. And so, my Father, wilt Thou give me the gift of love? Then I shall love Thee, and loving Thee, shall love other men – and compassion shall rise within me, warm and sweet. But I ask not merely to love those easy to love. Help me to love those who are hard to live with.
