If we don't know how or what to pray, it doesn't matter. He does our praying in and for us, making prayer out of our wordless sighs, our aching groans. He knows us far better than we know ourselves, knows our pregnant condition, and keeps us present before God. That's why we can be so sure that every detail in our lives of love for God is worked into something good."

Discussion points:

- 1. Joshua seems to see each person as a treasure. He has a way of making them feel incredibly loved and special, yet is also completely honest with them. How does this challenge you in the way you relate to people?
- 2. Discuss what happens to us when we experience the presence of Christ. The Puritans talked about three ways to experience Him:
 - a. Christ's *essential presence* Christ is everywhere present all the time. We are never far from Him, nor He from us. He is unavoidable.
 - b. Christ's *cultivated presence* Christians can enrich their sense of fellowship with Him as we abide in Him day by day, faithfully obeying Him. We may cultivate a deeper knowledge of the Lord through Bible study and prayer. As we do, Christ shows Himself to be much more present in our lives than we had realized.
 - c. Christ's manifest presence those times when God reveals His Son to a new generation of His people. He does so in such dramatic fashion that it almost seems as if Christ has been hiding from us until that moment. Then suddenly He reinserts Himself among us. He arrives. This encounter cannot be cultivated. It is a gift from the living God. It is an "awakening." It must simply be received.
- 3. Joshua's presence is a catalyst for transformation in individuals, in the Church, and in the community. What stands out to you in the way this unfolds?
- 4. Father Tordone experiences a 180 in the way he views not only Joshua but himself and others. When love pierced his heart, what changed?
- 5. What kinds of fruit should we expect to see when the gifts of healing, miracles, prophecy, and words of knowledge are operating as God intended?
