Background info:

- The tagline for this film is, "From the very pages of life itself!"
- The military action shown in this film occurred on the Eastern Front, with fighting primarily between Soviet and Nazi German troops. Of the estimated 70 million deaths attributed to World War II, approximately 30 million (many of them civilian) occurred on the Eastern Front. The human losses were staggering. The U.S. lost 420,000 (0.32% of the pre-war population); the Soviet Union's losses were close to 30 million (14.2% of the pre-war population).
- The two lead actors, Vladimir Ivashov and Zhanna Prokhorenko, were just nineteen years old, with little prior acting experience, when they were hired after the initially chosen leads were fired. This was the first major role for both Ivashov and Prokhorenko, and both went on to long film careers.
- The film won several awards, including the 1962 BAFTA Award for Best Film from any Source and the special jury prize at the 1960 Cannes Film Festival.
- This film was hailed as an instant classic by Soviet and American critics, with the New York Times offering it iconic status.
- In one scene we see a group of dispossessed Ukrainians (in national dress)
 en route to factory work in the Urals.

Scriptures:

Movie Nights for Thinkers and Seekers

Discussion points:

- 1. War is often associated with tremendous loss (e.g. loss of life, loss of relationships, loss of peace, loss of homeland, loss of property). Is it possible to compare one nation's level of loss with another's? one person's level of loss with another's? one kind of loss with another?
- 2. What kinds of love do we see in this film?
- 3. Even during the horrors of war, life goes on. What examples of daily life did you notice in this film?
- 4. Which of Alyosha's interactions did you like the best? Why?
- 5. Why was it so important for Alyosha to get back to the front so quickly after visiting his mother?
- 6. Discuss the love and the truth of Alyosha's interaction with Pavlov's father.
- 7. The film's opening includes this quote, "We will tell his story, a story not everyone knows -- not even her, his mother." How does this film help us to see that each individual is priceless, even in times of great trouble?
