Background info:

- This film is based on the 1998 book, "The Professor and the Madman: A Tale of Murder, Insanity, and the Making of the Oxford English Dictionary" (entitled "The Surgeon of Crowthorne" in other parts of the world.) Mel Gibson worked on adapting the book for over 20 years before production began in 2016.
- Legal battles, budget overruns, and scheduling considerations delayed the
 production and release of this film for several years. This was IranianAmerican director (and co-screenwriter) Farhad Safinia's first major film,
 but he is credited only under a pseudonym P. B. Shemran because of legal
 disputes surrounding final production. Both he and Mel Gibson have
 distanced themselves from the film.
- Filming took place in Dublin, Ireland and Oxford, England.
- Broadmoor Hospital, founded in 1863, is a high-security psychiatric hospital at Crowthorne in Berkshire, England. William Chester Minor was incarcerated here from 1872 to 1910.
- Oxford University Press is the largest university press in the world. It is governed by a group of 15 academics (appointed by the vice-chancellor), known as the delegates of the press. Oxford University Press was founded in 1586 and became a major printer of Bibles, prayer books, and scholarly works.
- The Philological Society, or London Philological Society, founded in 1792, is the oldest learned society in Great Britain dedicated to the study of language. A learned society is an organization that exists to promote an academic discipline, profession or group of related disciplines.
