Background info:

- The events in this film occurred in April 1940.
- The Norwegian title of the film is "Kongens nei," which means "The King's
 No." It was a co-production between Norway and Ireland and was selected
 as the Norwegian entry for the Best Foreign Language Film at the 2017
 Academy Awards.
- The King's car has the license plate A-1. In the film you can also see that the German envoy's car has the license plate A-88. 88 is a common abbreviation for "Heil Hitler" (H being the 8th letter of the alphabet)
- The "Storting" is the supreme legislature of Norway, established in 1814 by the Constitution of Norway. The unicameral parliament has 169 members, and is elected every four years based on party-list proportional representation.
- The Norwegian monarch is the monarchical head of state in Norway, which is a constitutional and hereditary monarchy with a parliamentary system.
- The present monarch is King Harald V (seen in this film as a child), who has reigned since January 17th, 1991, succeeding his father, Olav V.
- While in exile during World War II, King Haakon's daughter-in-law and grandchildren initially stayed in the White House with President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Scriptures:

Movie Nights for Thinkers and Seekers

Discussion points:

- 1. Haakon demonstrated great courage in defying Nazi Germany even while struggling with debilitating physical pain. What can we learn from the way he, a Christian monarch, worked within the boundaries of his nation's constitution and democratic principles?
- 2. One character noted that Hitler had said that a nation that wouldn't fight for its survival didn't deserve to live. How did quoting the enemy's leader reveal both truth of the situation and inform the nation's strategy in moving forward?
- 3. Honor can be defined as, "honesty, fairness, or integrity in one's beliefs and actions; a source of credit or distinction; high respect, as for worth, merit, or rank." Where is honor lacking in our world today? How can we sow seeds of honor? What would it look like for honor to be a part of how life is lived today?
- 4. Haakon's courage ensured Norway would actively defy the invasion longer than any of Germany's victims, and would continue to resist with a government in exile. What can we learn from this film about resisting evil in the face of extreme adversity?
- 5. One historian described the King and his family as "the central cluster of decency in a world gone mad." In what way you do see the world going mad around you today? What is an act of decency that you can do in that specific context?
